

How will you know if there is an emergency?

If there is an incident or emergency which could endanger the residents living near the Pontchartain site, you will hear the emergency alarm signal of 15 staccato blasts repeated 4 times on the Gamewell horn.

If there is a fume release, you will hear the siren for several seconds followed by a P.A. system announcement.

ALARM SIGNALS

Emergency

15 Staccato Blasts repeated 4 times on the Gamewell horn.

Fume Release

Siren for several seconds followed by P.A. system announcement.

All Clear

7 second blast on the Gamewell horn.

The testing of the plant siren is conducted every Tuesday at 10:00 a.m. All tests are followed by the All Clear signal.

What will happen in an emergency at DuPont/DuPont Performance Elastomers?

The DuPont neighborhood alerting system will also sound and a short message may be broadcast. If there is a problem, Civil Defense and the Sheriff's Office will be alerted. They will provide you with any emergency information you need. **Information can also be received by dialing (985) 536-5114, the DuPont Information Line.**

Prepare a Disaster Supplies Kit

Assemble supplies you might need in an evacuation. Store them in an easy-to-carry container such as a backpack or duffle bag.

Include:

- ◆ A supply of water (one gallon per person per day). Store water in sealed, unbreakable containers. Identify the storage date and replace every six months.
- ◆ A supply of non-perishable packaged or canned food and a non-electric can opener.
- ◆ A change of clothing, rain gear and sturdy shoes.
- ◆ Blankets or sleeping bags.
- ◆ First aid kit and prescription medications.
- ◆ An extra pair of glasses.
- ◆ A battery powered radio, flashlight and plenty of extra batteries.
- ◆ Credit cards and cash.
- ◆ An extra set of car keys.
- ◆ A list of family physicians.
- ◆ A list of important family information: the style and serial number of medical devices such as pacemakers.
- ◆ Special items for infants, elderly or disabled family members.

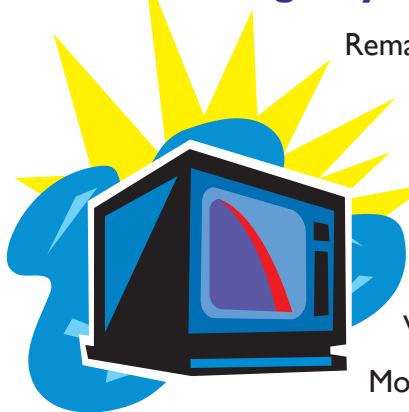

What Should You Do In An Emergency?



Remain calm.

If you hear the alarm signals, immediately go inside a house, building or vehicle.

Monitor cable TV or radio.

If you are told to Shelter-In-Place:

Stay as calm as you can and listen to directions given over the alerting system.

If you live close to the plant:

- ◆ Go inside your home.
- ◆ Close all your doors and windows.
- ◆ Turn off heating and cooling ventilation systems.
- ◆ DO NOT use your fireplace.
- ◆ Listen to your local radio or TV



Radio:

or WLMB 101.9 FM

TV:

WWL – TV 4, WDSU – TV 6,
WVUE – TV 8, WGNO – TV 2
RTC/Time Warner Channel 15

If you are told to Protect Your Breathing:

Cover your nose and mouth with a wet towel or other cloth.

If you are told to Evacuate:

Leave as quickly as possible and take only essential items, such as prescription drugs, identification and drivers license. Lock your doors as you leave.



If you need a ride, try to go with your neighbor.

Listen to your car radio WWL-870 AM or WLMB 101.9.

DO NOT:

Do NOT use your telephone

unless you or someone you know is injured or too sick to do what is necessary. (Sudden use of telephones by residents can jam the phone lines and interfere with communications. It would be best for you to wait for the local authorities to contact you with further instructions.)



Do NOT call or go to your children's school. Special precautions will be taken for school children.



How long will the emergency last?

A chemical emergency would be expected to last for only a few minutes. You should stay in your shelter until you are informed by authorities that the emergency is over. The All Clear signal will be sounded when the incident is over and it is safe to leave your shelter.

What if you cannot find shelter?

An enclosure, in any form, is the best protection in a chemical emergency. If you cannot find shelter, move so the wind is blowing from your left to your right or from your right to your left. Do not move with the wind blowing directly into your face or from behind you.
